

- ESG 40th Anniversary Social at SOPHE Conference, Alexandria, VA-Collaborated with National ESG board and James Madison University ESG chapter to organize the 40th Anniversary Social. Assembled gift bags, led official handshake, and obtained sponsorship from the University of Maryland School of Public Health (\$500) and Department of Public and Community Health (\$500).
- Pink Donut Campaign This was a health promotional event held around Valentine's Day to distribute information about HPV and cervical cancer detection and prevention. The pink donut theme was used because HPV infects the cervix, which has been visually described as a pink donut. ESG members handed out informational materials, donuts, valentine's cards, etc... to students on campus.

- Holiday Food and Clothing Drive for Community Ministry of Prince George's County- Seat Pleasant, MD
 Sponsored a winter food and clothing drive during the holiday season. Collected non perishable foods and warm clothes to the Community Ministry of Prince Georges County in the City of Seat Pleasant in Maryland (www.cmpgc.org).
- **Health Event** @ **NBC Channel 4 Studios**, Washington, DC- Invited to participate in a lunchtime health workshop at NBC Channel 4 Studios for employees. Hosted blood pressure screening, glucose screening, carbon monoxide testing, fitness testing, pedometer exercises, and giveaways!
- **ESG Scholarship Award** Sponsored annual membership dues for three outstanding public health education students, two scholarships for SOPHE membership and one to APHA.
- \$0.93 Bake Sale for Children's Inn at NIH- Hosted a healthy bake sale with each item costing \$0.93 to benefit the Children's Inn at NIH, which costs \$93 a night for families to stay. The Children's Inn at the National Institutes of Health is a residence for sick children and their families. Children come from across the country and around the world to stay together with their families in The Inn's healing environment while receiving groundbreaking medical treatments at the NIH
- Kids Enjoy Exercise Now (KEEN), Washington, DC- KEEN is a national nonprofit volunteer-led organization that provides cost to the families or caregivers. ESG members volunteered several Saturday sessions at the KEEN sports program at St. Coletta's in DC

Eta- Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant, MI

- SOPHE Town Hall Meeting. The Great Lakes Chapter of Society for Public Health Education (SOPHE) and the Eta Chapter hosted a town hall meeting to address the issues of health disparities in rural women of Michigan and show support to eradicate racial and ethnic discriminations.
- Relay for Life. In this event, different organizations on campus walk for 24 hours and raise money for the American Cancer Society to help find the cure for cancer. The Eta Chapter has been involved in this event for the past four years and this year raised over \$1000.
- Heart Healthy Awareness. Brochures, pamphlets and handouts were made to pass
 out to students on campus to raise awareness about making your heart healthy.
 People could make stress balls and they could write letters to people in a local
 hospital.

Other Activities:

- Breast Cancer Presentation. A PowerPoint presentation was given to a sorority on CMU's campus about breast cancer. In addition to the PowerPoint, fact sheets and contact information of hospitals were handed out. Also, the girls were given a demonstration and were allowed to ask questions.
- Fall Into Health Fair. Organizations of the community and on campus participate in a fair on campus to promote health. Eta makes a display board and gives away prizes.
- National Public Health Week. Every year a specific topic is chosen to promote Public Health Week. Activities are then provided to the community to educate them on it. This year elementary school children were able to make posters to be placed at local stores in Mount Pleasant.
- Team Building Event. All the members of the Eta Chapter went to a local park and participated in events that helped unify the group. Activities included a road rally, an egg toss, "me and all my friends" and others.
- Adopt-a-Highway. This event is held once a semester (twice a year). The members go to a specific spot on the highway that Eta has adopted and clean up the trash.

Iota- The University of Toledo, Toledo, OH

- Adopt a family: The event required participation from both members and students in our department. Money was collected from students, faculty and staff in our department to raise money for adopt a family. We were able to raise \$1,600 and adopted 3 families in need during the holidays. We collected the money, identified the family's needs, purchased the food and gifts, and wrapped and delivered them to each family.
- Rake & Run/COPD Information: 11 members, one other individuals and our faculty sponsor went into neighborhoods next to the university and raked elderly people's lawns. If the homeowner was available we told them a little about Eta Sigma Gamma and our goals. In addition to raking people's lawns we also tried

- to inform the community about Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease because it was COPD month.
- Spring Break Safety: 3 members designed a display board and material to hand out at residence halls on campus the week before spring break. The topics include skin/sun safety, safe sex and alcohol prevention.

- Special Olympics Volleyball: 6 members, 3 additional friends, and our faculty sponsor played volleyball with the Special Olympics group in Bowling Green Ohio.

At this event, the fundraising committee and ESG officers organized a silent auction for ESG members, friends, family, and UW-L community members to bid on donated items. In addition to the silent auction at the gala, the fundraising committee and ESG officers also held a formal dinner for all members and their families, as well as for new initiates, their families, and members of the UW-L community.

We pass out sheets about ways to reduce stress, pass out coloring sheets and crayons to help relax, as well as conduct a raffle for prices such as free back massage, bath products, and face logic care.
- Physical Assessment Day Helped complete 7 health assessments for 650 Introduction to Health students.

Other Activities:

- Dr. Abell- A professor from the Baylor Health Education Department came and talked to us at one meeting. He teaches the Epidemiology course for the department and knew several of the students in the chapter. He was an amazing lecturer and everyone enjoyed his speech
- Initiation Party- We initiated 3 new members this semester and had a party on campus in the regular room we meet in. Our sponsor and other faculty members were also invited and we went through the ceremony. Afterwards we ate and talked with the new members.
- End of Year Party- We presented the new officers and wrapped up the year with comments and food! It was a fun way to say goodbye and hang out one more time before the semester ended.

What is a concern of your chapter?

- Although the chapter raised money to pay for chapter expenses we would have liked to have funds for future members.
- Maintaining membership and motivating support from members. Raising funds to send members to regional and national public health conferences.
- The biggest concern is getting members to join and becoming active in the chapter. Once members are initiated the motivation to participate goes downhill.
- The major concern for our chapter is active membership. We have found it difficult to set a time for meetings and activities that is convenient for our members. Our students are non-traditional so they do not live on campus. Most of them have classes during the day, jobs in the evenings and go home or work on the weekends making it difficult to find a good time for meetings. This has been a problem for elected officers being involved too (as you can see from our multiple treasurer/secretary members)
- One major concern this year for our chapter was our organization skills. All of
 the officers on the executive board were new, so it took a while to get into the
 swing of things. Also, member-candidates had a hard time committing to
 activities they signed up for. We had many students interested in the organization
 at the beginning of the school year, but interest declined dramatically as the year
 progressed.
- Recruiting and retaining members

- The major concern of our chapter this year was to increase the number of participants in our Sigma chapter. I think we did accomplish an increase in number, but we are still lacking in participation.
- Recruiting students from all academic levels to be part of ESG. We have had some success this year recruiting from the undergraduate levels but we would like to increase recruitment efforts next year again.
- Having adequate finances and determining activities which are of interest to our members.
- Leadership is very hard to maintain with the nature of students graduating so often. The leadership of the organization is critical to our success. Once a good leader is established and trained, it is time for them to graduate.
- Whether the chapter will continue to be active and increase presence on campus
- Recruitment of non-traditional students
- We should provide more emphasis on research, implementation and evaluation of all of our major activities so that all members of our chapter get to experience all aspects of implementing a health education program before graduation. This will be the main focus of our chapter next year.
- Increasing undergraduate student attendance/participation.
- Increasing graduate student enrollment AND attendance/participation.
- Being able to hold meetings where there is a significant amount of undergraduate and graduate students represented, especially seniors. For the upcoming year we have already set dates for our events including the meetings. Members decided to have a set day and time for meetings so that members can plan ahead for events and meetings.
- There are none, every year our chapter continues to grow productively.
- Recruiting underclassmen into the organization to give a sense of stability rather than annual membership turnover. Also, integrating the graduate division into all activities initiated by the undergraduate division (as well as initiating their own activities).
- Member Participation (due to home/ work/school commitments)
- Getting college support for ESG
- Low recruitment pool due to limited # of students in the Health Major (small college/small major)
- We need to build our membership and get more of our current members to be more active.
- A major concern of our chapter is recruiting new members that are willing to participate in our chapter activities. Many of our new initiates join ESG simply as a resume builder and the lack of input and participation has been a major issue that we have had to deal with this year. We talked about enforcing an attendance policy, but never followed through with our discussion.
- Recruitment and sustainability of membership.
- Keeping members active; involved; participating in the Chapter
- Increasing member involvement in the community and on campus
- We do not currently have any concerns. We feel comfortable as a chapter.

- Recruitment and retention of members
- Financial concerns with sending students to conferences to present or preside over sessions
- Creating social and service activities for our chapter. The vast majority of the university student population lives off campus.
- Participation from members in the spring semester. The fall is very easy because
 of the conference responsibility but much more difficult during the spring because
 of graduation. Also, scheduling activities that fit the member's schedule. Too
 many activities can become confusing and too little can make it so member's have
 trouble reaching their hours.
- My major concerns as being president of ESG are mainly communication. Some of my other concerns are interest from the SIUE students that have major and minor in school or community health education. Our communication also needs to be worked on between our advisor and officers.
- Promoting active membership
- Keeping students active.
- Participation is a major concern for our chapter. It is hard to plan meetings each week at a convenient time where everyone is able to attend. We alternated Tuesday and Wednesday nights each week for the first semester and then changed it to every Tuesday night this semester to simplify the schedule.
- The Gamma Lambda chapter at University of Texas at El Paso focuses on providing its members with opportunities that will help them expand and explore their particular interest in Health Education. This is done by providing members with a variety of student activities and volunteer opportunities in a broad range of areas. By doing this Gammans are more able to identify a certain health interest area. The major concerns of our chapter are to help our unique border community by getting involved with the Health Education community and sometimes being their
- Feet to get the word out on particular issues. We also are concerned with providing our members the opportunity to grow not only academically, but also professionally. Which we are addressing monthly at our meetings by incorporating mini-professional development presentations.
- Need to be more involved in advocacy and need more students to attend professional development events and conferences.
- Needs improved commitment from honorary members
- Revitalization. Recently elected officers are excited and motivated. They all have experience with
- Similar organizations and form a cohesive and effective team. With the help of our advisor,
- Our new officers will continue to revitalize our chapter.
- Would like sophe conference, when ESG meets there, to have us work as 'monitors' (like at asha) to defray registration costs
- Continuing the momentum that we generated this past spring. I believe we have an excellent,

- Enthusiastic executive board and they will pave the foundations for a strong chapter.
- We did not have any major concerns this year; the majority of members had great attendance at monthly meetings and volunteered for the required hours. We as officers established an attendance and philanthropy policy at the beginning of the semester so members knew what was expected of them.
- From the adviser's standpoint, maintaining consistently high quality leadership and programs. We are a commuter campus, so all students are very busy, often working and taking classes.
- The major concern of our chapter is raising money for the Relay for Life. Cancer affects everyone and we, as a chapter, want to fight back against this disease.
- We lose many active members during the fall semester to internship requirements in the spring.
- We restarted our chapter earlier this year. As with any new organization, we are challenged with limited recognition around the university, limited financial resources to plan social and education activities, and learning operational tasks within ESG. Our next challenge is recruiting future members to expand the chapter.
- Fundraising. The ideas to raise funds become harder to pursue and less creative. The institution is also providing less and less support through student senate. Funds are very completive. Last year, we received \$0 from student senate.
- The major concern of our chapter is developing and sustaining motivation and involvement in ESG leadership and activities. All of our members work and many have families and children, so they don't have time to come to meetings or participate in events. Another concern is motivating people to attend our events.
- One major concern for the chapter was the lack of participation from members.
- Our chapter's major concern is to raise awareness of our profession, and to help connect our members with other professionals in the field. We also try to get our members to get experience in the field by volunteering.
- Despite a concerted recruiting effort at the beginning of the fall and spring semesters, we were unable to gain many new members. We have decreased the GPA required to a 2.75 and also minimized the mandatory time commitment, but our small numbers (with several graduating) make doing any very large projects difficult.
- Financial Because our ESG is new and our health Ed program merged with nursing, the new chair said that there would be 'seed' money for our ESG next year.
- Gaining new members and striking an interest in underclassmen. Also money is always tight because of the small chapter, so larger service projects are hard to address.

What can the National Office do to make your chapter more effective?

- More National Newsletters throughout the year.
- Provide more grant opportunities or links to methods to gain scholarships and funding. Provide incentives for graduating members at no cost (honorary cords).

- The National Office can provide more conferences/activities for just the members. There should be a conference for the members to interact and share ideas between each other.
- Nothing we need to provide good leadership at the local level
- Provide more funding
- Nothing specifically at this time. National office is excellent at communicating and we wish for that to continue.
- Provide greater financial assistance, earmarked specifically for recruitment and promotion of ESG.
- JMU's Sigma Chapter would like to become more active at the national level. It would be very helpful if the National Office could update the website, including information such as major events that schools around the nation are completing at the present time.
- Nothing, they are very supportive.
- Not at this time. They have been very prompt in sending out induction information and materials, we appreciate that. Thank you.
- The National Office can send mentors to individual chapter events to help steer members in the right direction.
- There needs to be a method for inner-chapter communication. A possible solution would be for the National ESG website to host a forum for ESG officers and member to exchange ideas, express concerns and form collaborative partnerships.
- Allow collaboration between Brooklyn College and St. Francis College it will
 open up a larger recruitment opportunities at the same time benefits for both
 colleges in planning health activities.
- More local events for chapters within the individual states to foster more ESG member interaction.
- Offer more benefits such as liability insurance or reductions on student health insurance.
- Provide us with more ideas about different social activities, service activities, professional activities, etc. that we can do to encourage more participation. Provide us with information about what has worked in other chapters.
- Suggest "best practices" for enhancing members' participation
- Continue to offer grants and opportunities at the national level
- We cannot think of anything that the National Office can do to make our chapter more effective. Thanks for everything!
- Financially through endeavors
- Provide free marketing material about ESG
- Any advice on scheduling and how to choose off campus activities that are both health related and forgiving for member's schedules. Also, advice on money management
- When posting different ideas from different ESG chapters, it would be nice to be able to find it easier. It would also be nice to have showcased different chapters on the website each month.
- I think it would be nice to send an email or a newsletter once a month or semester updating ESG

- Members on what other chapters are doing around the country. The update would hopefully stir ideas and promote activities within Eta Sigma Gamma. It would also give recognition to the chapters working diligently to promote health in their communities.
- Overall, the National Office has been a huge help for all of our new officers. The
 only suggestion we can make is to possibly have funds and scholarships available
 to members for tuition, or possibly for travel to National Eta Sigma Gamma
 events.
- What can the National Office do to make your chapter more effective? Assist with improved financial
- The National Office has been very supportive in our efforts to revitalize our chapter.
- Everything is great
- Continue to send us ideas for activities.
- The national office could offer more suggestions on ways to promote public health around
- Our campus. The meetings were effective in that they offered our students more information on careers in health but applying creative ideas to these meetings would be much more beneficial for both the students and our campus.
- You have been exceeding helpful this year. Please send information on honorary memberships and distinguished service awards.
- Resources to help promote ESG on our campus. We would like for students at CCU to know what ESG is and what we stand for so when we try to do things on campus, they recognize our honor society and want to help out.
- The National Office can assist us by providing recruiting materials, if available. In addition, information about other chapters and their activities would immensely help our new chapter with ideas for future activities.
- The National office could provide us with some ideas for activities which might motivate and encourage participation in ESG activities.
- Provide educational scholarships to "active" ESG members. Perhaps scholarships
 can be made available to at least one member per chapter based on GPA and the
 amount of community service activities.
- The Delta Phi Chapter would like to have members attend conferences, and in order to do that, we will need help with financing.
- Perhaps the National Office could consider altering the membership eligibility requirements to allow more students from a more diverse background to participate in ESG. For example, many health related areas of study have attended member informational meetings, but were unable to join our chapter because they did not have a health education major or minor. I think areas of study similar to ours would be of benefit to include (i.e. exercise sports science, physical therapy, athletic training, health sciences and the like).
- Advice for ESG activities we currently look at ESG online to see what other ESG's are doing.
- Keep national ESG GAP at 2.7 We adopted the 3.0 but really could expand if it were 2.7 overall

• Many students have a higher GPA within the major than overall
